CCRA EVENTS

Tour of A-Building, Progress Campus

We had 13 members participate in a campus tour of the A-Block in the A-Building at Progress Campus on Wednesday, November 13, 2024. The tour was led by Samira Bullock, Manager, National Recruitment -Tours and Recruitment Events and Sean Kinsella, Director, the Eighth Fire. It was an inspiring tour! Visiting the "basket room" was a highlight. The tour ended with refreshments from the Dehwigan Cafe, which offers



Indigenous inspired and made to order menu items and also features items that are directly from Indigenous companies, including Birch Bark Coffee. "The domed shape is the od-e (heart) of the building," says Eladia Smoke, Lead Architect of Smoke Architecture. "It's wrapped in a wood finish that reflects the geometric scale-like pattern on the outside of the



building. It recalls local architecture such as the wiigiwaam, and follows the principals of the nimii-idiwigamig (Anishinaabe Roundhouse)." There are further architectural references to the four directions, connections with the earth and sky worlds and a fireplace installed for holding ceremonial fires, which is extremely rare in institutional settings. The art featured is by Cree/Métis artist Rebecca Baird and features the moon with the four sacred medicines, semaa (tobacco), giizhik (cedar), bashkodejiibik (sage) and wiingashk (sweetgrass).

"This nickname is a dream Eladia Smoke had when the building was called 'heart building' but was unfinished," says Eladia Smoke, Lead Architect of Smoke Architecture. "The Anishinaabemowin word for heart is 'od-e' and the suffix for several words for buildings is '-igan.' Since the path through the building shows glimpses of both incompletion and completion, the first syllable is incomplete."

Centennial in the News

The past few months have been a time of significant change at Centennial. Like other colleges, Centennial is navigating sector-wide challenges connected both to federal policies that have dramatically impacted enrolment and to longstanding provincial underfunding. As a result, the College has had to make some difficult but necessary decisions in the short term so that the College can continue educating students for career success for years to come. Each decision has been made through the lens of preserving the quality and continuity of the student experience, as much as possible.

In January, the College <u>paused the intake of new students in 49 programs</u> following a comprehensive, evidence-based review. In March, the College was in the early stages of planning to <u>relocate programs from the Story Arts</u> <u>Centre</u> to the Progress Campus. Neither of these decisions were taken lightly, and staff are proceeding with care and understanding, to ensure that the College preserves the spirit of the Story Arts Centre.

The College's work supporting learner journeys continues, and there are a lot of positive stories and reasons to celebrate, even as the College navigates change. Take, for example, annual events such as the <u>Student</u> <u>Awards Night Celebration</u> and the <u>Mock Disaster exercise</u>, or the College's rank among Canada's top 50 research colleges, including being <u>the number one ranked College for providing paid student internships in</u> <u>applied research</u>. Thanks to the generous support of some of the College' industry partners, the Progress Campus is getting some exciting upgrades that will be announced soon.
